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Dear Parents of Rising Sixth Graders,

Model Laboratory School's summer reading program requires each student entering a middle school language arts class to complete a summer reading assignment. We believe this program will encourage students to explore more reading than the time in class allows and that this will also encourage and promote more active reading on the part of our students. Research shows that summer reading not only sustains students' reading skills, but that it also enhances their abilities.

For summer reading this year, I thought I would shake things up a bit. I wanted to highlight the social aspect of reading, and I was inspired by social media sites such as GoodReads and LibraryThing, where users share book reviews and recommendations with their friends and family. But I also wanted to protect students' privacy and comply with COPPA laws for children under 13, so I found a website that allows K-8 students to share their reading experiences with their classmates while protecting their privacy. The website is called Reading Rewards (www.reading-rewards.com). For summer reading this year, students will use Reading Rewards to log their reading, write book reviews, and discuss books online. You'll find the project requirements, book list, rubric, and helpful instructions in the pages that follow.

Summer Reading Projects are due by Tuesday, August 16, 2016. The grades for these activities will count toward the grade for the first nine-weeks grading period. Completion of the summer reading assignment is required for successful completion of the course. Please encourage your student to avoid procrastinating. Feel free to email me with any questions or concerns regarding summer reading. I wish you and your family a happy and healthy summer!

6th Grade Summer Reading Requirements

Students will:

- Sign-up for a free Reading Rewards account
- Read 2 books from the Kentucky Bluegrass Award Masterlist for Grades 6-8. Students/Parents are responsible for obtaining copies of their books.
- **Log** his/her summer reading on Reading Rewards
- Write a **book review** for both books and post them on Reading Rewards

Book Review Requirements

Each book review should have **3 paragraphs** as follows:

- **Paragraph 1:** A summary of the book (no spoilers!) that includes brief descriptions of the main characters in the book. Be sure to include the book title and author in the first sentence.
- **Paragraph 2:** A personal response to the book. What did you dislike and/or like about the book? Why?
- **Paragraph 3:** A recommendation of the book. What kind of reader would you recommend this book to and why?

For more detailed information about the book review requirements, please see the rubric at the end of this packet.

Extra Reading Pizza Party

I want to encourage students to read MORE than just 2 books over the summer, so students who read a TOTAL of 4 or more books over the summer will be invited to participate in a pizza party and movie in Aug/Sep.

To be invited to the pizza party, students must:

- Read 2 EXTRA books over the summer for a total of 4 books
- Log these books on his/her Reading Rewards account
- Note: you do not have to write reviews for the 2 extra books.

The 2 extra books are the student's choice and do not have to be chosen from the KBA/summer reading list. However, these 2 extra books must be new to the student (i.e. something they haven't already read), students must read the books during this summer vacation, and the books must be at an age-appropriate level and length (i.e. not Dr. Seuss) for each student's reading level.

Paper Bookmark Reading Logs

The paper bookmark reading logs that are attached at the end of this document are provided as a helpful resource only. They are not required and will not be collected. They are provided only to help keep track of reading log information for those times when you do not have Internet access. You must still transfer all reading log information to the Reading Rewards Website in order to earn all points for the summer reading project.

Reading Rewards Instructions

Setting up a Student Account (students under 13 need parent email and permission)

Step 1) Go to URL: <http://www.reading-rewards.com/sign-up.html>

Step 2) Click on the 'Sign me Up!' button in the Readers column and follow the signup instructions (unless they already have their own account from a previous year)

Step 3) Have your child Sign In to their account

Step 4) Click on 'Reading Circle › My Groups'

Step 5) Search for our group in the Search box: our group name is **Mrs. Kendrick's 6th Grade** (this must be typed in exactly as it appears here, or you will not be able to find our group). Alternatively, you can also search by the security code below.

Step 6) Click on our group, and enter the security code: **W7HWHU**

Logging Reading Time

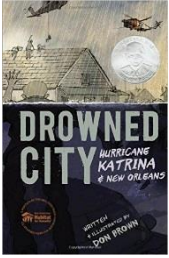
- To log your reading, under the “Reading” tab, select the “My Reading Log” tab, then “Log Reading Time.”
- If this is your first time logging this book, you’ll need to add the book to your library before you can log reading. Click on “Add New Book to My Library”
- Search for your book, select it from the list, and click “Add Book to my Library”
- Enter your reading date. Now, you can enter your reading time: put in the number of minutes you read and leave a comment about your reading. Remember that Mrs. Kendrick can read your comments. 😊
- Keep logging your reading until you’ve finished reading and logging both required books. And if you read extra books, log those too!

Posting a Book Review

- After you indicate that you finished your book when logging it, you will be asked to review it. You can also reach the book review from “My Library” and “My Reviews” under the reading tab. Type your review in the space provided. Make sure you save the review or any changes you make to it!
- Each book review should have 3 paragraphs as follows:
 - Paragraph 1: A summary of the book first (no spoilers!)
 - Paragraph 2: A personal response to the book. What did you dislike and/or like about the book? Why?
 - Paragraph 3: A recommendation of the book. What kind of reader would you recommend this book to and why?
- You can edit your book review later if you need to. Under the “Reading” tab, go to “My Reviews” and click on “Edit my review” next to the correct book.

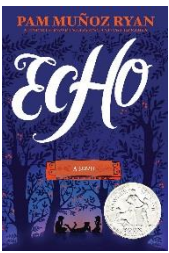

Drowned City: Hurricane Katrina and New Orleans / Non-fiction Graphic Novel, 920 Lexile
Don Brown – Houghton Mifflin Harcourt, 2015.

On August 29, 2005, Hurricane Katrina's monstrous winds and surging water overwhelmed the protective levees around low-lying New Orleans, Louisiana. The riveting tale of this historic storm and the drowning of an American city is one of selflessness, heroism, and courage--and also of incompetence, racism, and criminality.



Echo / Fiction, 680 Lexile

Pam Munoz Ryan; Dinara Mirtalipova, ill. Scholastic Press, 2015.

Lost in the Black Forest, Otto meets three mysterious sisters and finds himself entwined in a prophecy, a promise, and a harmonica--and decades later three children, Friedrich in Germany, Mike in Pennsylvania, and Ivy in California find themselves caught up in the same thread of destiny in the darkest days of the twentieth century, struggling to keep their families intact, and tied together by the music of the same harmonica.

Rebecca Stead – Wendy Lamb Books, 2015.

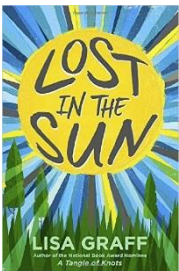

Dan Gemeinhart – Scholastic Press, 2015.

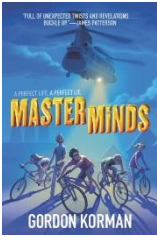

Lisa Graff – Philomel Books, an imprint of Penguin Group (USA), 2015.

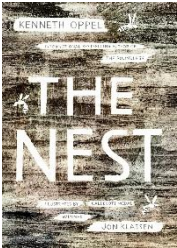

Kenneth Oppel; Jon Klassen, ill. – Simon & Schuster Books for Young Readers, 2015.

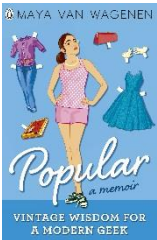

Once it is uttered, can it be taken back?



Losers Take All / Fiction, 890 Lexile

David Klass – Farrar Strauss Giroux, 2015.

Jack Logan is the youngest brother in a family of talented football players, and he might actually enjoy sports if he were not constantly pressured into taking one up. When the new principal decides that all seniors must play on a team, Jack and a ragtag group decide to get even by starting a rebel JV soccer team whose mission is to avoid victory at any cost.



Popular: Vintage Wisdom for a Modern Geek / Non-fiction Memoir, 730 Lexile

Maya Van Wagenen – Dutton, an imprint of Penguin Group (USA), LLC, 2014.

Maya has never been popular, but before starting eighth grade, she decides to begin a unique social experiment - spend the school year following a 1950s popularity guide, written by former teen model Betty Cornell and record the results. Told with humor and grace, Maya's journey offers a thoroughly contemporary example of kindness and self-confidence.



Rhyme Schemer / Fiction, Novel in Verse, 520 Lexile

K.A. Holt – Chronicle Books, 2014.

This novel in verse follows one seventh grader's journey from bully-er to bully-ee, as he learns about friendship, family, and the influence that words can have on people's lives.

- Only post about school-appropriate topics using school-appropriate language.
- Use each other's names when responding to discussion questions to avoid confusion.
- Reread your messages before sending to avoid confusion.
- Actively engage in the conversation by posting thoughtful responses to the questions

Failure to follow these guidelines could affect your grade for the summer reading project and result in possible disciplinary action when the school-year begins. Mrs. Kendrick has final editorial control of all book reviews and discussion posts.

Book Review First Sentence	The first sentence includes the title, author, and a creative lead.	Title and author are both listed immediately, but the lead is not engaging.	Either the title OR the author is missing.	Title and/or author are not mentioned at all.
